

for the HOPE that you have.

Peter admonishes us to always be ready to give an answer for our hope within us, that we as Christ followers should live with an ever-readiness because God is always breaking into our worlds and drawing people to Himself and He invites us to join Him in His grand mission.

We here in the lower mainland have seen evidence of this with the hundreds of Syrian refugees God has sent our way. Gracepointers went to the Surrey hotels refugees were temporarily housed in and brought gifts and prayers. Angels watched silently as one Gracepointer prayed with a Syrian man whose family had been surrounded by ISIS for four days back in Syria. I listened in on Good Friday morning as two regular Gracepointers shared the reason for their Easter hope with two Syrian families. This relationship with these two families continues to this day through one of our discipleship groups.

God showed up and showed off at our April church lunch as He brought 120 Syrian refugee people to join us for lunch that day. We joyfully shared food and conversation with them. One Gracepointer remarked that this is what church is supposed

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to look like and another commented that it felt like "real church".

Since that luncheon Gracepointers have reached out with food hampers, furniture, conversation, and God's love and grace in abundant measure.

We are a church that engages our world. We do this because we are compelled by the gospel. We are people who share the living hope that we have within us. This isn't something we manufacture or make up. We've been to the well and we've drank from the living water and we feel compelled to share the hope that we have within.

We are a church that experiences God. On Sundays and between Sundays in our discipleship groups we get filled up with God's love, hope and grace. We connect with God daily and are revived at our soul level. Like the Psalmist (see Psalm 23), our cup overflows with the good things we receive from God and it spills out.

We of course do all this together. No person is an island. No one ministers alone. We watch each other's backs and we move forward together by power of the Holy Spirit.

The Spirit continues to blow in great things into our midst. I believe the best days of Gracepoint lie in our future. Together we're going to follow the Spirit's leading. Together we're going to obey his callings into our lives. I continue to pray with my eyes wide open that I might see what God is up to in our midst.

Recently a Gracepointer lost a family member in a tragic car accident. When I heard the sad news. I was shaken because I was on that same highway that same weekend. I remember thinking "that could have been me." Our time here on this earth is short, regardless of how long we live. There are a lot of things we can give our lives to in our remaining days. How many of them will enable us to enter eternity with no regrets? I truly believe that being a people who together experience God and engage our world is something worth giving our life towards with our remaining days. Will you join me in a full pursuit of this worthwhile goal with your time, talents and treasure?

EXPERIENCE

I was reminded (actually I was gob-smacked to use a very British colloquial) that there is great power and kingdom building when we invite. On six separate occasions I very intentionally invited people to attend either an event or start something with me this past month or so. The positive response left me with Holy Spirit-inspired goose bumps.

While the content and context of the invite varied, there were a few common chords that echoed. One was that we crave connection. At first it seemed a paradox to me given we all have busy lives and seem to have our little corner that we occupy in the world. But then I reflected that we all want to have a place – at our work, in our homes and families, and with our peers and friends.

Yet finding that place can be a challenge. Sometimes we feel we don't belong or fit, but more often I think we feel excluded and left out—on the outside looking in if you will. Sometimes the exclusion is thrust on us—not having the "right" perspective or position determined by someone or something external.

But, more often, I think we exclude ourselves by thinking that we don't belong, can't belong or shouldn't belong. Missing out on the beautiful community that happens with inclusion.

When I take the time to invite someone to something (anything), what I'm really doing (even without realizing) is that I'm inviting that person into a part of me, to connect with me. I am communicating belonging. I am inviting them "in." How beautiful is that!

Invitation tends to call out abilities and talents we don't necessarily see in ourselves. When I invite someone to join me in doing something, I am saying "your contributions matter." I am saying "you are talented in this." I declare "you can do this!" When I seek someone out, ask them to involve themselves in something and see something we may not see in ourselves, it touches a deep, tender place where someone can offer a piece of themselves to our world.

Personal invitation, not impersonal mass marketing or general invitation, communicates worth. It says "I value"

your involvement, your perspective, your presence. The proverbial shoulder tap invites a person to engage, to give and also to receive.

Is this concept of invitation not what Jesus did when He called his disciples in the gospels. Look at Mark and Luke—look at his invitational language throughout the gospels? He invited them into something much bigger than their individual lives—He invited them, simple people with ordinary jobs, to follow and be equipped to do history making, world changing things!

Invitation and kingdom purpose have direct link. It is HUGE when we invite people to spend time with us, in our everyday lives. Don't underestimate it! We build community and relationships, opening wide the doors for people to belong and meet Jesus. Invitation makes space for people of every stripe and stand to feel valued and contribute. It is such a treasure! Don't miss out on your next opportunity to invite people to journey with you!



Spring is also a great time to sow spiritual seeds that will blossom to nourish our souls. In order to help bring about spiritual growth, consider the following ideas:

• Connect to God. A great way to know God is to read His word. A good place to find a Bible reading plan, especially one with variety, is found at the following website: https://www.bible.com/reading-plans that can be read on your mobile device, anywhere you go (bus, park, beach, or at home). If you go to this site you can find varied Bible reading

plans around numerous topics. Choose the one that connects with your interests. Better yet, challenge someone to do this plan with you for a month. You can even gather with your reading partners bi-weekly to discuss "What is God saying to me through the reading?" and "What am I going to change in order to obey?"

- Connect with God's Family. Get to know others in a different setting by hosting a potluck barbeque at your home, local park or beach. Or if you prefer, invite the group to join you at a favourite restaurant. During the meal you can update each other with praise or prayer items.
- Connect with the Disconnected. A great way to take advantage of the warm weather and longer days is to invite a neighbour to your home, or ask them to join you at a local coffee shop for a snack or meal. Begin to pray about who God would have you to invite. It's amazing what can grow from a smile, and offer of hospitality. May your Spring season be marked by the rhythms of life and renewed spiritual practices.



As a child, I was fascinated with light and refraction of light. I would gaze with delight at the spectrum of colour, at the depth of perception those lights and mirrors offered—making the space seem larger, brighter, than it actually was. give to others. I learn His truth and then proclaim it. This is my mandate.

How can we, as cracked stones, do this? Remember the diamond? The sun didn't care that this diamond was damaged. That big ball of light in the sky used every facet to its advantage. Our God and Father can and will use us to His Glory the same way, if we align our will with His. All of us have imperfections that, perhaps, make us hesitant to believe God could use us. Yet we have been blessed with the promise of the Holy Spirit, (Luke 11:13). The risen Christ promised us power to witness through His Holy Spirit, (Acts 1:8) and in 1st Corinthians 2:13 reminds that the Holy Spirit is our Teacher. We have a Guide into all truth (John 16:13).

Perhaps the analogy of the diamond doesn't work for you. Maybe you see yourself more as a pot with dirt in it? Well, God uses cracked pots too! His love fills in the cracks—healing the hurts, restoring the relationships, covering the sins, filling us up. He remolds us and as I have been known to say, "Only God can make us cracked pots hold water!" Beloved, trust Him! He loved you where He found you but His love can and will carry you farther than you ever thought possible!





STITION

KIDS UNLIMITED CHECK-IN

(for kids 2 years - Grade 5)

Check-in at the KU table in the lobby before the service. Worship with your kids in-service until they are invited to the front and dismissed to their teaching time with their leaders. Parents are more than welcome (and encouraged) to accompany their children to their classes. Please check in babies 0-23 months directly in the Nursery.

KIDS UNLIMITED REGISTRATION

(for kids 0 years - Grade 5)

If you're new or haven't already completed a KU Registration or Visitor Form, please do so you can stay up to date on what's happening. Visit the check-in table in the lobby today.

KIDS UNLIMITED DROP-OFF / PICK-UP

For safety purposes, children (Nursery-Grade 5) should remain with their parents until they are dismissed from the service. Parents must pick up their children immediately following the service.



NURSERY

(0-23 months)

Parent-Participation Nursery opens at 10am. Volunteer Caregivers will be on duty to supervise and assist in the Nursery once children are dismissed from the service (approximately 15 minutes after the service begins).

The Fireside Room is available for nursing moms from 10am until noon.

Baby Mum Mums are available upon request as a snack. To keep the Nursery allergen-free and food-safe, no other food is permitted.

EARLY CHILDHOOD

(2-3 years & 4-5 years)

Parents of preschoolers are welcome and encouraged to accompany their children downstairs to their classes when dismissed from the service.

ELEMENTARY

(Grades 1-5)

Children join their grade group outside of Studio A before going in for their large-group teaching time. They will then go to their small group classroom. Parents pick up after the service in the classrooms.

We are delighted to present to you:



École de théologie évangélique du Québec, abbreviated as ETEQ

The new identity ÉTEQ, takes elements from the two denominational school histories:

- From the Mennonite Brethren: École de théologie évangélique de Montréal (ÉTEM), formerly Institut Biblique Laval (IBL), and;
- From the Christian and Missionary Alliance: Institut Biblique VIE (IBVIE) and a CMA predecessor called ETAQ (Enseignement théologique de l'Alliance au Québec).

With the blessing of their church families ÉTEM and IBVIE have joined as one school, partnering with other schools and universities to prepare women and men to serve Jesus Christ in the francophone world. Over the past five years of operating together, the two schools have developed three certificate programs, one bachelor's degree and a new master's degree.

We believe ÉTEQ will continue to serve God's Kingdom in many ways. To name a few:

- Setting an example of how Christian groups can work together in a secular, post-Catholic context;
- Establishing an economy of scale better use of financial and human resources:
- Building a solid base of well trained, professional teachers and staff;
- Building partnerships where few have existed before;
- Strengthening our relationship with Laval University.

In the book of Ezekiel, particularly in Ez. 37:15-22, we read of symbolic events that seem to speak into this kind of joining together what would normally have stayed separate. Ezekiel holds up two pieces of wood inscribed with the names (Judah and Joseph), to show that what was once distinct is now to be joined. There is no doubt that this passage may be a basis for a wide variety of interpretation and application, however, in the case of our two schools becoming one, we take as our example this image of two pieces becoming one, two schools uniting under God.

Will you join us in praying for the men and women who study and serve at ÉTEQ? May each and every one be better prepared to know and serve Christ wherever he or she may be called!

MISSIONARY REPORT: Independent Living

"Cindy" had been coming to school in the same clothes every day, not able to shower. She has shared that sometimes they had no hot water to wash herself or her clothes. She had a continuing case of head lice. The amazing staff at the school had been very busy with keeping the head lice at bay for the last few years. Cindy has parents that are continuing to deal with their drug addiction which has led to the removal of Cindy from her home. She has been in foster care for over a year now. In November, a staff member asked if I would become more involved in Cindy's life. It has been an eye opening experience for me to see such pain in this young girl as she is trying to make sense of it all. She has an amazing attitude despite her circumstances. We are building a trusting relationship over time as we spend time together.

She has recently been placed into her second foster home due to circumstances that were beyond her control. She now has to adjust to a new home, new and different family and possibly a new school; she feels like she is starting all over again. I cannot imagine what it would be like to be in her shoes. My commitment to her as a Youth Unlimited worker is to be the constant adult in her life from here on. That is what we do well in Youth Unlimited.

I was reading in the Old Testament in Deuteronomy, were God talks to us about taking care of the orphans and widows. There are far too many orphans in our community. God has called us to take care of them.

I have had an eye opening few months as I work alongside these young kids at an elementary school in our community. I have been walking alongside many kids that fit the category of being an orphan. What does that look like today? It can be kids who have a parent or parents who have checked out due to their own life problems. We are called to look after the orphans and I am blessed to be able to do this with your help. I thank you for your prayers as well as supporting me in the call of serving youth in our community.

MB Mission

Take a close look at this picture. What do you see?



Prayer? A light? Somebody playing a keyboard? A really tall guy?

I took this picture in April while attending an MB Mission AWAKE weekend in St. Catherine's, Ontario. The picture is a fascinating window into the marvelous diversity of the mission of God in the world; a mission that is from everywhere to everywhere.

Here's what you're looking at:

- A Laotian couple (purple sweater, blue and white jacket on left) who have just responded to God's call to return to their homeland from the security of life in Ontario to introduce Buddhists to Jesus. He was once on the path to being a Buddhist monk. Oh, and he's 70 years old!
- A Mexican who grew up in Oakland, California (black t-shirt in the middle) who gave his life to Jesus in college and has now given 15 years to building an orphanage and church planting in Thailand.

- A young woman (white shirt on right) who is months away from leaving Canada to join church planting in Portugal. She can't quite explain the deepening love she has for the Portuguese, but it's truly moving her!
- That tall guy and other followers of Jesus from the Niagara area (gathered in prayer around the other 4). They had just spent the day on mission together in their own city, discovering that mission



is here, there, and everywhere.

Now, what do you see here?

Yes, that's the Gracepoint building and you may be in it! This picture was taken in April when our church family hosted over 100 refugee families for lunch on a Sunday afternoon.

Since we live in a multi-cultural city like Surrey we may miss the wonder of this moment. The tragic displacement these new friends of ours have experienced has brought people we as a community could never before have reached right into our neighbourhoods. This is a marvelous wonder and calls us

to realize the mission of God is everywhere—and everywhere is coming to where we are.

So. let us awake...

- How did Jesus find you wherever you were?
- Who did he send your way?
- Who has he given you a growing love for?
- What part of the picture of Jesus mission are you uniquely suited for?
- What will this demand of you?



Great things happened on April 15, 2016 in support of something even more great! A lot of money was raised and a lot of community happened! It was a sparkly, beautiful night where our people and our networks said with their time and resources "Community Dinner matters," "people matter."

For the past 19 years, 52 weeks a year, the Gracepoint Community Dinner has fed the hungry, elderly, lonely, hearing impaired, mentally ill and working poor in the main hall of Gracepoint. Those in need are provided with a homemade meal and friendship in a welcoming, non-threatening, non-judgmental and safe environment. We regularly serve people of all ages, from seniors, to mothers with babies and young children.

On average, the Community Dinner serves 200 guests per Sunday. While

this program is intended to be both delicious and nutritious with dinner usually including salad, vegetables, a meat dish and dessert, there is more nourishment to be had. Along with food for the body, there is a nightly devotional that reminds our guests we cannot live on bread alone. Prayer and counselling are offered for all those seeking further assistance.

In order to support the cost of providing a weekly dinner, a fundraiser has been held for the last three years. This year's fundraiser was the largest ever. With over 280 guests in attendance, the event was sold out a few days in advance. Not only was the dining room packed, but also the church lobby was filled with guests hoping to out-bid one another on the more than 175 items featured in the silent auction.

During the evening, Vancouver Groove Orchestra wowed the

audience with their big band sound. A few guests rightfully hit the floor to show off their dance moves. I particularly enjoyed the manner in which they arranged and played a few hymns. You will never hear a better rendition of "It Is Well". Surrey City Councillor Vera Lefranc was happy to model one of several cakes (baked by Gracepointers) during a cake auction. Speaker and author Richard Lemieux shared his own story of how he went from success to attempting suicide, to finding hope at a community meal. He reminded those in attendance that offering a plate of food to someone is offering hope.

Extending hope is what the Sunday Night Community Dinner is all about. The fundraiser allows us to continue offering hope in tangible ways to those who need help the most.



Syrian Refugee Luncheon

"You must not mistreat or oppress foreigners in any way. Remember, you yourselves were once foreigners..." Exodus 22:21

On Sunday April 10, at our regular church luncheon, Gracepointers welcomed with open arms and open hearts approximately 120 recent Syrian refugees. All had been picked up that morning by a 15 passenger van and a heavily overloaded 54 passenger bus. Some were also driven to our church by Gracepointers who have developed relationships with several refugee families.

Ernie and Marie and kitchen team prepared a wonderful Hallel lunch which Gracepointers and guests enjoyed. Though separated language and religion, Gracepointers utilized technology such as 'Google Translate' and lots of gestures to interact with our guests and demonstrate the love of Christ. There were lots of activities for the kids as they did a craft, received a balloon animal and got to pick a toy from the "toy store" of gently used toys donated by Gracepointers. There were many smiling faces, hugs and expressions of thanks from our new Syrian neighbours as they boarded the bus and van back home.

The vision for the luncheon began when Gracepointers began to visit the Syrian refugees in the Sheraton and Sandman hotels in the Guildford area. Some remained there day after day through our rainy weather with little to occupy their time. By the time of our luncheon, they had all been moved to homes in the Surrey/ Delta area and the bus picked them up at a few locations.

Since the luncheon many Gracepointers have continued relationships with some of our guests, particularly through our discipleship groups. One Gracepoint senior began chatting with the two women and their kids who were sitting at her table using the Google app. After the luncheon she asked the simple question: "how can I serve you?" Initially reluctant answer to question. the Gracepointer asked one of the women again, "how can I help you?" The lady

> confessed that she and her husband and three kids only have the clothes on their backs as they were only allowed to bring 22 lbs of luggage with them on the flight. This Gracepointer exchanged phone numbers with her and they went shopping the next day finding outfits for the whole family.

These relationships will continue in the months and years ahead as Gracepointers continue to ask that vital question "how can we serve you?" and together we'll don the towel of servanthood and love our new neighbours in Jesus' name.

Lavish Generosity and Spirit-Led Stewardship

On May 29 we will be holding a Financial Town Hall to discuss both the 2015 financials and our 2016 budget. In case you will miss the Town Hall, below is our 2016 budget and a few highlights from last year. The full 2015 Financial Statements are available by requesting them from the church office.

2015 was a turning point for Gracepoint in many respects and I think it's fair to say that we are currently in the strongest financial position we have been in for many years: we have stewarded well –

being disciplined in our spending and generous in our giving (i.e. the refugee finances being raised in a single offering!) My prayer is that this continues as we are blessed with resources and opportunities.

We approach 2016 with Spirit-led stewardship that allows for room to be a little nimble and follow where God is calling us, as He calls us this year. We are able to balance needs of our ministries and people with the obligations and responsibilities inherent to building ownership.

On behalf of the Leadership Team and staff, I want to thank all of you for your support of Gracepoint—whether financial or through prayer, volunteerism and involvement—it has contributed to the stability of our church and our ability in 2016 to thrive and follow God's kingdom purposes for us well.



2015 Financial Highlights

- Our total receipts in 2015 were \$1,058,383.
- General donations for the year were \$836,039; about \$36,000 more than we had budgeted for.
- Out of that excess we gave additional support to our MB Conference and we increased the amount in our Contingency Reserve Fund so that we are in a better position to deal with any future capital costs.
- The Contingency Reserve Fund currently sits at \$42,400.
- You gave \$34,349 towards supporting our refugee family. That money is being used this year to help them get established in East Beach.

- Our operating expenses were \$950,977—about \$215,000 less than the previous year and about \$34,000 less than we budgeted for.
- The growth we experienced towards the end of 2015 gave us a bit more flexibility when establishing the 2016 budget.
- Currently our donations are tracking at about 1% over budget.


2016 Budget


